Our donors continue to provide us with funds and sellable items to support our monthly vet bills.

Kitten Season Is Here

People often tell us that they've heard the term 'kitten season' but do not know what the term means. It refers to the season when unspayed cats bear litters of kittens. The exact time of year depends on the region and the climate that given year. On the Northern Neck, and most all of Virginia, kitten season is between April and October. During this time of year, shelters and rescues are over capacity

with momma cats and their kittens. With last Fall and this past Winter being warmer than normal, kitten season has been extended. We received calls for litters of kittens into late Fall and Winter. With the arrival of Spring, the calls just keep coming.

If you come across a kitten or litter of kittens alone outdoors, you may feel the need to scoop them up and take them inside, but that might not be the best thing for them. While it might seem like the kittens have been orphaned, most kittens are not abandoned by their mother. It's important to give the mother cat time to return as keeping kittens with their mother is the best nutrition for the kittens. If the kittens are in an exposed or unsafe area (e.g., near a street), you can move them a short distance to a safer location, such as under a nearby bush.

If You Find Young Kittens

Don't touch or move them

Mother cats often leave for hours at a time to search for food or new location, or may be scared by your presence. Keeping mother with kittens gives them their best chance at survival.



Stay away 35 ft. or more, if kittens aren't in immediate danger. She may not return if she senses your presence.



If you're certain mom cat hasn't returned in 24 hour period, learn more about properly caring for them.

Once the kittens are in a safe spot, wait for the mother to return. It could be several hours before she comes back. Often, she has simply been away getting food. Sometimes she's nearby, but is hiding until you leave. Watch from inside, or at least from a good distance, so the mother cat feels comfortable returning to her kittens. If the mother cat seems friendly, you may opt to bring all of them into your home. It's best to keep the entire family together in a small, quiet, enclosed space such as a bathroom or spare bedroom. You'll want to provide cat food, water, and a litter box.

If the mother cat is not socialized with people, you should ideally leave the kittens with her outdoors unless they are in immediate danger. If the mother is unsocialized, her kittens will need to be socialized to be able to be adopted into a home. Kittens need to be socialized as soon as possible.

If after several hours and no mother cat returns, you may decide to take the litter in. You may choose to care for the litter yourself, at least until the kittens are old enough for adoption. If you are seeking support from a rescue group such as Garfield's Rescue Inc. (GRI), call or email first to make sure there is foster space available.

The only way to end 'kitten season' is to spay/neuter

pets and community cats.
Kittens become sexually active at four months of age, making



them parents by the time they are 6 months old! A female can have up to 4 litters per year. You can help prevent the unnecessary birth of so many homeless kittens.


A Cat Café Friend

In December 2021, Garfield's Rescue Inc. (GRI) was

introduced to Kitty Kingdom Cat Café (KKCC) in Chesapeake, Cat Cafes are social VA. enterprises. helping local rescues find homes for adoptable felines. By definition, a cat café has an eating establishment in the same



building as the feline showrooms. For a fee visitors interact with the cats while enjoying a beverage and a bite to eat. KKCC is the only cat café in Hampton Roads fitting the definition of cat café. Cat cafés showcase foster cats seeking a match between a



loving family and a homeless cat. All adoption fees go to the sponsoring rescue group such as GRI.

The GRI and KKCC partnership has created loving homes for many of our foster cats and kittens. The felines at

KKCC are truly royalty in every sense. They have their own TV and sleep wherever they want. The

kitties have access to food and water 24/7. Staff keep the litter boxes clean and sanitized. KKCC is truly a royal place for homeless cats to live as they wait for a loving family.

KKCC has facilitated over 420 adoptions working with GRI and other rural rescues. If you are in the Hampton Roads area, please visit KKCC and let them know that you heard about them through GRI. Management of Homeless Cat Colonies

St. Francis of Assisi, patron saint of animals and environment, said "all the darkness in the world cannot extinguish the light of a single candle." Garfield's Rescue, Inc. (GRI) elected to light that candle to resolve the suffering of homeless (community) cats. Homeless cats, often referred to as "feral", live in managed cat colonies throughout the Northern Neck (NN). GRI and other community volunteers provide care with daily food, fresh water, warm shelter, necessary medical attention, and spay/neuter/vaccinations to approximately colonies. A colony may consist of two to seven cats. These cats may have been abandoned or born in the wild and have reverted back to an instinctual state in order to survive.

Volunteers provide daily care pursuant to a monthly schedule, eager to switch days or vacation weeks with each other to ensure the care of all colonies is

provided daily.
Feeding and watering continues during inclement weather.
Volunteers with SUVs take over the



care of multiple colonies when others cannot get out of their driveways due to snow or downed trees. All of the cats have names as it personifies them and gives them an identity. All have a tipped ear indicating they have been spayed/neutered,

received medical exam and state required vaccinations.

Cat colony populations are reduced and stabilized through sterilization. All state required vaccinations are administered when the cats are trapped, spayed/neutered. All kittens are removed from the colony and placed into GRI's successful foster to adopt program, immediately reducing the colony size. Friendly stray cats are scanned for microchips and returned to their owners, or re-homed. Any cats that can be socialized enter our foster to adopt program. Unsterilized, a female cat can have up to four litters per year, 4-5 cats per litter. It is the responsibility of our entire NN community to humanely manage the reproduction of owned pets through spay/neuter/vaccinate programs to assist in the stabilization of a healthy cat population.
